




# SUPPORT PROGRAM







### SASKATOON PROGRAM

One of the Network's mandates is to provide supports and services that gain positive outcomes for individuals and families with FASD. To provide these services, the organization created its Support Program in 2011. Over the last 10 years, the program has expanded to include services in Saskatoon and Regina as well as provincial support services and programs that specialize in intensive services for clients who have involvement with the Ministry of Social Services or the justice system.

Now referred to as the Saskatoon Support Program, the services provided to clients in Saskatoon and the surrounding area continue to positively impact the lives of both individuals and their families. In its first year of services, the program provided support to 33 clients, now with several full-time staff providing FASD-informed support, the program had 105 clients access services in the 2021/22 fiscal year.

The Network continues to see an increase in the awareness of the Support Program, with 52 referrals being received this year, a 73% increase from the previous fiscal year. Due to the hard work and commitment of the Network's Support Workers, 34 of these referrals were moved to active case files and were able to receive support services. Every year, since its launch in 2011, the Saskatoon Support Program has seen an increase in the number of clients seeking support services. As the program continues to grow, the organization remains committed to providing services to anyone in need.



### **REGINA PROGRAM**

Several years after beginning the Support Program in Saskatoon, the Network conducted a needs assessment and determined that support services were needed across the province. To address this gap in the services, the organization began expanding the program, including the addition of a Regina Support Program in 2018.


For the past four years, the Regina Support Program has continued to grow seeing an increase in the number of clients accessing services, the number of referrals received and awareness of the program in the community.

In 2021/22, the Regina office continued to operate a full-service Support Program offering all of the same services as the original Support Program developed in Saskatoon. The program provided active services to 71 clients, a 73% increase since the Regina Program was launched four years ago. In total, the program received 29 referrals throughout the year and was able to transition 41% of these clients to active case management.

It is expected that the number of clients and referrals will continue to grow as the Network focuses on forming community connections and partnerships with other service providers in Regina to offer holistic, wrap-around services to individuals and families who are impacted by FASD.







### **PROVINCIAL SERVICES**

FASD affects people from every community. With approximately 4% of Saskatchewan residents living with the disability the Network created the Provincial Support Program to provide services outside of the Saskatoon and Regina areas. Currently operating from the organization's Regina office, the Provincial Support Program provides the same support and services as the Saskatoon and Regina programs.

With clients located across the province, the Provincial Support Worker continued to rely primarily on virtual meetings and over the phone support during 2021/22 as COVID-19 regulations continued to impact the organization's ability to travel to different Saskatchewan communities. Even with a limited ability to meet with clients, the Provincial Support Worker was able to support 57 clients throughout the year.

With clients accessing services from over 37 Saskatchewan communities, it is evident that there is a need for FASD-informed services in every region of the province. Knowledge of the Network's provincial services continues to grow with a 24% increase in the number of clients receiving support since the program began in 2017. During this fiscal year, the organization provided services to clients from 19 new communities that had not previously been reached by the program.

The Network will continue to find innovative ways to offer support services to anyone in need in any Saskatchewan community.

### **INTENSIVE SUPPORT PROGRAM**

One of the specialized services offered by the Network is the Intensive Support Program, an ongoing program to provide high-level services to families affected by FASD who are involved in the child welfare/protection systems. The goal of the program is to assist families in thriving together as a unit by addressing the challenges caused by FASD. This includes direct case management, education on the disability, strategies for addressing the challenges in the home, and advocacy to the other service providers working with the family. There have been excellent outcomes for the families who have accessed services in the five years this program has been available.

In 2021/22, there were 28 families receiving support services from the program. It was estimated that, as a result of services provided through the program, 25 families were able to stay together and 3 families were reunited. Contracted on an hourly basis by the Ministry of Social Services, the program delivered 1259 hours of services this fiscal year.


The Network looks forward to continuing its partnership with the Ministry of Social Services to offer these important services and empower families in need of support.



### **INTEGRATED JUSTICE PROGRAM**

The Integrated Justice Program was created as a direct response to the TRC Call to Action #34 that focuses on the need for justice reform to support Indigenous individuals with FASD. The Network was invited into the program in partnership with the University of Regina and File Hills Qu'Appelle Tribal Council in 2019.

The two-part program combines the Network's expert support services with the preparation of trauma-informed Gladue reports to provide holistic support to Indigenous individuals with FASD who have involvement in the Saskatchewan justice system. Operating in both Regina and Saskatoon, the support services of the justice program have expanded over the past three years to include direct case management, advocacy, and Gladue aftercare. During this fiscal year, the program provided support services to 132 individuals with FASD. With 54 referrals being received throughout the year, the program saw a 54% increase in the number of referrals for clients seeking FASD-informed support in the justice system.



As part of the Integrated Justice Program, the Network invested in certifying Gladue Writers, allowing the organization's staff to develop comprehensive release plans as well as Gladue submissions. These are specialized reports that focus on the experiences of Indigenous peoples.

The program operates one of the only Gladue writing teams in Canada allowing them to produce reports quicker than is typically done in Saskatchewan and at no-cost to the individual. In the 2021/22 fiscal year, the Integrated Justice Program's Gladue team prepared and submitted 16 trauma-informed Gladue submissions and 13 comprehensive release plans. According to an internal evaluation done this year, 93% of lawyers working with clients reported that the information in the Gladue document assisted with their argument before the court and 100% of the clients regarded the document as part of their healing journey.

### **SUPPORT MEETINGS**

In 2021/22, the Network continued to offer monthly support meetings to provide opportunities for caregivers and individuals to connect with their peers to share experiences, provide advice, and receive ongoing support.

This year, the Caregiver Support Meetings remained virtual to increase the accessibility for caregivers located across the province. The meetings are now facilitated by a caregiver with personal experience raising an individual with FASD. The monthly meetings had 18 caregivers attend throughout the year.

In early 2022, the Saskatoon Peer Support Meetings returned to in-person meetings with much excitement from the individuals who attend. With the combination of virtual and in-person meetings during the year, the peer meetings had 43 individuals attend to connect with others. When the Saskatoon meetings returned to in-person activities, the organization also decided to expand the meetings to Regina and began offering monthly meetings out of the office there as well. With three meetings being held in Regina this year, there were 3 individuals who joined. The Network is excited to continue growing the reach of the Regina Peer Support Meetings in the new fiscal year.

Along with the meetings for caregivers and individuals with FASD, the Network provided two targeted support meetings for youth during the year. The FASDiversity meetings are intended for youth with FASD who identify as queer, questioning or allies to meet new friends and discuss topics such as safer sex, healthy relationships, etc. There were 2 youth who attended the virtual meetings this year.

The Network also launched a Youth Connections meeting, an online meeting for youth ages 13-18 to connect with other kids who are also impacted by FASD. The meetings create a safe space for attendees to share their unique experiences and make friends. There were 2 youth who joined a Youth Connections Meeting.






### **FASD TRAINING**

The Network offers several different training modules, each providing information targeted to a specific demographic. In the 2021/22 fiscal year the organization provided two different FASD trainings intended for professionals.

The organization's training session "FASD for Frontline Workers" has been providing education on FASD since 2015. The Network continued to offer these sessions virtually during the year increasing the reach to professionals from all across Canada with some joining from international communities as well. Throughout the year, 3 sessions were held with 181 attendees joining from approximately 44 different communities. The FASD for Frontline Workers training session continues to be one of the most effective ways the organization provides in-depth knowledge and training on FASD to the professionals and organizations who support individuals and families.

To provide further education on the disability, the organization launched a new training session titled, "Understanding FASD." With the purpose of providing more information to professionals, these sessions focus on the brain domains of impairment that are impacted by prenatal exposure to alcohol. Understanding the impacts on the brain domains can allow professionals and support workers to offer services that are tailored to the specific needs of each individual with FASD. After launching in the fall of 2021, the organization offered 4 sessions of the Understanding FASD training with 349 attendees joining from 41 communities.

The Network continues to receive positive feedback on its FASD training and with the increased accessibility of virtual sessions, the organization is able to reach more people with much-needed information on FASD. When organizations and services providers are educated on the unique challenges caused by FASD they are enabled to provide the support required by individuals and families who are impacted by the disability and improve their quality of life.



## POST-SECONDARY PRESENTATIONS


The Network has been delivering presentations on FASD in post-secondary classrooms across Saskatchewan since 2005. This year, the organization delivered a combination of virtual and in-person presentations to increase awareness and education of FASD. The presentations continue to be very well received from both students and instructors from a variety of areas of study.

In 2021/22, the Network delivered 22 Post-secondary Presentations to approximately 706 students across the province. Each of these presentations discussed the impacts of prenatal exposure to alcohol as well as the need to support the individuals and families who are affected by the disability. The goal of these presentations continues to be preparing students for future careers and providing them with education on FASD.

# COMMUNITY PRESENTATIONS

The Community Presentation program is intended to provide awareness of FASD to members of the general public by delivering introductory presentations to communities and other organizations. These presentations provide accurate, up-to-date information on FASD to help encourage further learning about the disability.

The majority of the Community Presentations delivered this year were held virtually with a total of 21 presentations reaching 285 Saskatchewan residents from communities across the province. These presentations remain highly requested by communities and groups across the province allowing the Network to increase awareness of FASD and work towards lowering the prevalence of the disability through education. The Network will continue to ensure presentations accessible to everyone looking to learn more about FASD.



# FOSTER PARENT TRAINING

The Foster Parent Training module is the result of a partnership between the Network, the Ministry of Social Services and the Saskatchewan Foster Families Association. Each year, the Network provides mandatory training sessions on FASD to potential foster and adoptive families preparing them for their future roles as caregivers to individuals with FASD. As one of the organization's longestrunning training programs, the Network continues to see the positive impact these training sessions have on foster and adoptive placements in the province.

5 sessions were delivered to 64 caregivers this year. The Network ensures that each Foster Parent Training session is delivered by a caregiver to someone with FASD, allowing them to share their personal experiences, advice, and insights to the attendees.

# CUSTOM PRESENTATIONS

Each year the Network gets several requests to develop and deliver custom presentations on FASD. In 2021/22, the organization created 17 custom presentations that were attended by over 349 people.

These presentations included conference keynote presentations, break-out sessions, and tailored presentations requested by different groups and organizations. Presentations were requested for groups such as CanFASD, Child & Family Programs, OutSaskatoon, local schools, training for workers at the Ministry of Social Services and various group homes in the province. Offering custom presentations allows the Network to reach diverse groups with information about FASD that is specific to their industries and the services they provide to individuals and families who are impacted by the disability.


### 64 FOSTER/ADOPTIVE PARENTS TRAINED ON FASD



#### **FASD AWARENESS DAY**

Since 1999, September 9<sup>th</sup> has been devoted to International FASD Awareness Day and recognized around the world as a day to raise awareness of the disability and celebrate the individuals and families who are impacted.

To celebrate the 2021 International FASD Awareness Day, the Network held a free, virtual "FASD Fundamentals" event. The informative evening included information about how FASD occurs, the primary disabilities caused by FASD and how it affects the lives of individuals and families. The event was presented by the Network's Training Manager and was open to anyone who wanted to learn more about FASD. The FASD Fundamentals event had 63 people log in to join the virtual presentation.

### FASD IN THE CLASSROOM

In 2022, the Network held its first official conference for educators. The virtual event was a single day of presentations intended to improve the educational experience of children with FASD by providing education on the disability and strategies for support to Saskatchewan educators.


The day included presentations from Dr. Wiebe, Developmental Pediatrician at the Alvin Buckwold Child Development Program, and Dr. Pei, a Professor in the Department of Educational Psychology and Assistant Clinical Professor in the Department of Pediatrics at the University of Alberta. The Network was very pleased to have 83 educators attend the event. There was great engagement and feedback from the audience.

### **FASD SESSIONS**

The 6<sup>th</sup> annual FASD Sessions conference was held using virtual presentation software. For this year's event, the organization chose to feature presentations that provided a framework for how other organizations and service providers could implement the Network's five guiding principles. Sessions included presentations on how to create low barrier to access support, how to operationalize client-led support, the need to have trauma-informed services, the benefits of harm-reduction approaches, and how to combine all these philosophies to create services that are FASD-informed.

The two-day event included presentations from Network staff as well as experts in the field of FASD and the provision of community-based services. In total, this year's conference had 68 attendees. Hosting the FASD Sessions conference as a virtual event allowed the Network to expand the reach of the important information being presented with attendees joining from over 29 different communities.

The feedback received after the event was very positive. 69% of attendees indicated that this was their first time attending a Network training or event and 100% of survey respondents said they found the information presented at the event to be beneficial. A comment from one attendee included, "I feel like I gained an incredible amount of knowledge and will continue working towards being more informed."

The Network would like to thank everyone who helped make the 2022 FASD Sessions another successful event.






### **MARKETING**

The Network uses a combination of online communications and traditional mass media to provide accurate, positive education on FASD. This year, the Network used its social media accounts, website, printed resources and an outdoor marketing campaign to create awareness of the disability.

The organization's social media following continues to grow with international audiences sharing content about FASD. This year, the Network was active on Facebook, Twitter, LinkedIn and Instagram to reach a wide-ranging audience. There was a 9% growth in the organization's audience with over 7959 followers on Facebook alone.


Along with various social media accounts, the Network ensures that its website provides the most accurate and up-to-date information on FASD and the services provided by the organization. Throughout the year, the Network's website had 24,963 page views with approximately 81% of viewers residing in Canada and the remaining 19% located in international communities. With an increasingly global audience, the Network will continue to provide valuable information about FASD through its website.

In 2021/22, the Network launched an educational marketing campaign focused on providing quick information about FASD to the general public. The "Learn More" campaign highlighted four key messages including the rates of FASD in Canada, that FASD impacts every culture, that the disability affects everyone differently and that it is an invisible disability. The marketing campaign combined radio advertisements, posters across three Saskatchewan cities, transit ads on public bus routes, and advertisements featured on the University campuses. This marked the first time the organization has launched a marketing campaign of this scale. The feedback received from the public was very positive.

#### **RESOURCES**

The Network provides information, awareness, and education on FASD by creating and distributing resources across the province. By providing both printed and digital copies, the organization makes sure the educational information is accessible to as many people as possible.

Even though the Network did not attend many in-person events or activities during the 2021/22 fiscal year, the organization still distributed 6073 copies of the printed resources with an additional 2563 copies being downloaded from the website. Once again, the "FASD Awareness Guide" remains the most popular resource with a total of 5901 copies being distributed and downloaded.

### **TOLL-FREE CALLS**

Since 2002, the Network has provided support and education on FASD through a toll-free line operated from the Saskatoon office. For years it has been a valuable resource for professionals, caregivers, and individuals to contact the Network, find out more about FASD, and get access to much-needed services.

To monitor the use and impact of the phone line, the Network records data for each incoming call. In 2021/22, the Network received approximately 443 calls to the toll-free phone line. 75% of these callers were searching for support services with about 25% contacting the Network for the first time. It was also recorded that 89% of the callers were residing within Saskatchewan and the remaining 11% were contacting the Network from outside of the province.

After twenty years, the toll-free line continues to provide a valuable service and is an essential point of contact for people looking for both information and support.

### **COMMUNITIES REACHED**

It is estimated that FASD impacts 4% of Canadians, this includes individuals and families from every Saskatchewan community. The Network believes in the importance of providing FASD services and education to as many of these communities as possible.


Each year, the organization attempts to find innovative ways to increase its reach and provide support to as many clients as possible. Over the past few years, this has included the launch of the Provincial Support Program and the inclusion of Provincial Trainers located in communities across the province to increase the reach of the organization's support services and training program.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, the Network began offering events, training sessions, and support services through virtual software. This mandatory shift in operations allowed the organization to reach more people and communities than ever before.

Throughout the year, the Network had clients and event or training attendees from 91 Saskatchewan communities.

In total, by providing virtual events and presentations, the organization reached people across the world from approximately 214 communities located in 6 countries and 9 of the Canadian provinces and territories.


The Network is pleased to see the reach of its services and education continue to expand. Providing accurate and positive information about the disability remains a core part of the organization's mandate.




